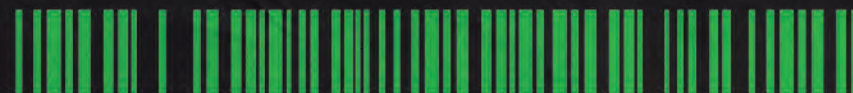

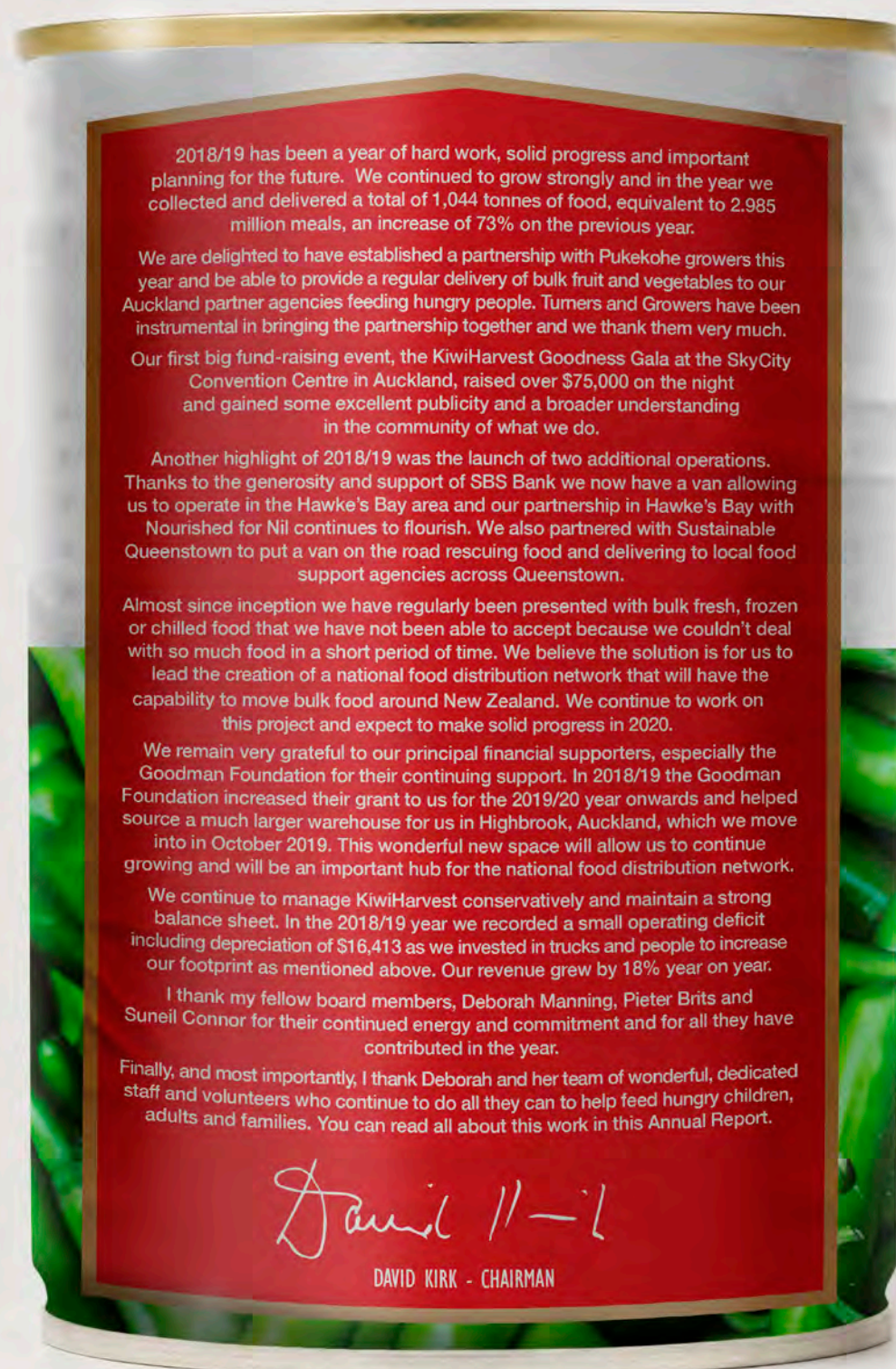

RESCUING GOOD FOOD TO NOURISH OUR COMMUNITIES



2018/19 has been a year of hard work, solid progress and important planning for the future. We continued to grow strongly and in the year we collected and delivered a total of 1,044 tonnes of food, equivalent to 2.985 million meals, an increase of 73% on the previous year.

We are delighted to have established a partnership with Pukekohe growers this year and be able to provide a regular delivery of bulk fruit and vegetables to our Auckland partner agencies feeding hungry people. Turners and Growers have been instrumental in bringing the partnership together and we thank them very much.

Our first big fund-raising event, the KiwiHarvest Goodness Gala at the SkyCity Convention Centre in Auckland, raised over \$75,000 on the night and gained some excellent publicity and a broader understanding in the community of what we do.

Another highlight of 2018/19 was the launch of two additional operations. Thanks to the generosity and support of SBS Bank we now have a van allowing us to operate in the Hawke's Bay area and our partnership in Hawke's Bay with Nourished for Nil continues to flourish. We also partnered with Sustainable Queenstown to put a van on the road rescuing food and delivering to local food support agencies across Queenstown.

Almost since inception we have regularly been presented with bulk fresh, frozen or chilled food that we have not been able to accept because we couldn't deal with so much food in a short period of time. We believe the solution is for us to lead the creation of a national food distribution network that will have the capability to move bulk food around New Zealand. We continue to work on this project and expect to make solid progress in 2020.

We remain very grateful to our principal financial supporters, especially the Goodman Foundation for their continuing support. In 2018/19 the Goodman Foundation increased their grant to us for the 2019/20 year onwards and helped source a much larger warehouse for us in Highbrook, Auckland, which we move into in October 2019. This wonderful new space will allow us to continue growing and will be an important hub for the national food distribution network.

We continue to manage KiwiHarvest conservatively and maintain a strong balance sheet. In the 2018/19 year we recorded a small operating deficit including depreciation of \$16,413 as we invested in trucks and people to increase our footprint as mentioned above. Our revenue grew by 18% year on year.

I thank my fellow board members, Deborah Manning, Pieter Brits and Suneil Connor for their continued energy and commitment and for all they have contributed in the year.

Finally, and most importantly, I thank Deborah and her team of wonderful, dedicated staff and volunteers who continue to do all they can to help feed hungry children, adults and families. You can read all about this work in this Annual Report.

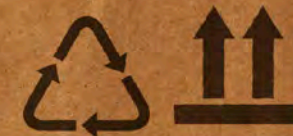

In June 2018, we were invited to be part of the New Zealand delegation at the APEC High Level Policy Dialogue on Enhancing Public and Private Partnerships to reduce Food Losses and Waste (FLW) for a Sustainable APEC Food System in China Taipei.

The Forum recognised the urgent need to reduce FLW in the supply chain to achieve food security and a sustainable food system and the important role of public-private partnerships in achieving food security.

They also noted UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) Target 12.3, which calls on governments, the private sector and individuals to, "By 2030, halve per capita global food waste at the retail and consumer levels and reduce food losses along production and supply chains, including post-harvest losses."

What does this mean for KiwiHarvest?

It means it is time to think big and to act now. Our long term vision is that all food-insecure individuals and families will have access to nutritious fresh food as part of their daily diet and that no good food will go to waste.

To achieve that we intend to establish a national rescued-food distribution network where fit-for-purpose but unable-to-be-sold food can be received in bulk and then distributed to areas of high need around the country to feed vulnerable people. We will work with landowners to establish warehouses in strategic locations, food donors throughout the entire food supply chain, cool store providers, other food rescue organisations, social support agencies, transport logistics providers, corporations, government departments and individuals who share our common goal of protecting our environment and alleviating hunger in New Zealand.

The first step has already been taken. Thanks to our founding supporters, Goodman Foundation, we are moving into a new warehouse at Highbrook Business Park in Auckland. From here we will receive large quantities of bulk food for distribution throughout Auckland and further afield. This will provide a solution to a problem for many of our large food donors - the difficulty in finding an organisation that can safely and efficiently receive large quantities of their donated product and distribute it responsibly.

TRANSPARENT ACCOUNTABILITY

Identifying, measuring, and reporting on our social returns in a transparent and accountable way helps us achieve our economic, social, and environmental objectives and shows our true impact in the community. Thanks to the University of Otago, our Social Return on Investment (SROI) impacts have been calculated and resulted in a SROI ratio (social value) of \$5.16 for every \$1 invested. This means for every \$1 invested in KiwiHarvest we return \$5.16 of benefits (health, social inclusion, environmental outcomes, employee engagement and more). The report found, "KiwiHarvest's food rescue activities created significant economic, environmental, and social impacts for its stakeholders ... KiwiHarvest's SROI ratio is in line with successful Australian food rescue organisations thus justifying current and future investment to cover operating expenses."

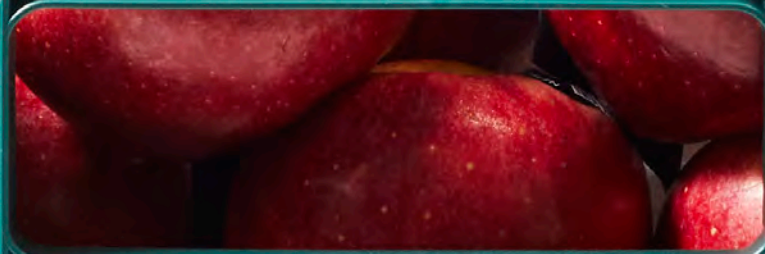

A major highlight of the year was the beginning of our close partnership with Frucor Suntory who helped put a truck (named 'Whakaora') and driver on the road to support individuals and families in South Auckland. Throughout the year, they have helped with product donations and distressed product to all our branches across the country, the loan of chillers for events, onsite storage at Wiri when we had run out of space, and in-kind support from their staff as volunteers. At Christmas time, food items donated by Frucor Suntorians were passed on and used to make up Christmas hampers for food-insecure families.

We are excited to continue our partnership with Frucor Suntory in 2019/2020 and create even more goodness together!







WORLD SANDWICH DAY

On Friday 2 November, Subway restaurants around New Zealand came together to fight food insecurity in celebration of World Sandwich Day. In partnership with KiwiHarvest, every guest who visited a Subway and purchased a sub, salad or wrap got another one free, and Subway donated the cost of a KiwiHarvest meal to support our work to help fight food insecurity.

Subway staff, alongside other influential New Zealanders who gave their time, passion, and talents, entered into the spirit of the day with decorations and activities. Each donation made by Subway was captured on the Subway Live Feed digital tracker. Subway's effort and commitment to World Sandwich Day was evidenced by an outstanding result, and consequently an extremely generous donation to KiwiHarvest that allowed us to rescue and deliver the equivalent of 110,496 meals to the New Zealand community.

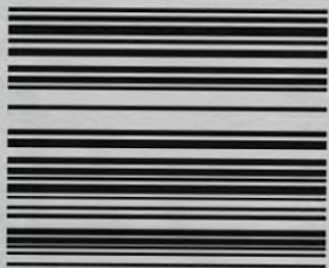

Thanks to the team's great energy in the kitchen, over 200 meals went back into the Dunedin community.
