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# 

2016/17 has been another year of amazing achievement by FoodShare. Deborah and her wonderful team and volunteers have increased the number of meals delivered by over 46% compared to the previous year. In 2016/17 FoodShare delivered 820,574 meals to hungry people. As we grow, the rate at which we can grow further in the Dunedin region slows down but the total number of meals we provide continues to grow very strongly. Last year FoodShare rescued and delivered 260,431 more meals than the previous year.

This success is the result of great people and partners and highly professional operating processes including food handling, staff training, logistics, fund raising and performance measurement. FoodShare continues to be a social venture run as a successful business with results measured in community profit rather than financial profit.

FoodShare has grown from its birth in Dunedin in 2012 to be a multi-city organisation. The holding company for the group is now called The New Zealand Food Rescue Group. The financial statements you will read later in this report are for the New Zealand Food Rescue Group, which incorporates FoodShare in Dunedin and KiwiHarvest in Auckland. All money donated specifically to one or the other of the two operating companies is strictly separated and directed to that company for the benefit of the local communities served.

Many Dunedin based organisations have generously contributed to FoodShare's fundraising in 2016/17. We especially thank Downie Stewart Lawyers, JN Lemon Charitable Trust, Mercy Hospital Charitable Trust and NZCU South for their ongoing support.

A highlight of the year was our chefs and gifted (so they say) amateur chefs cooking event at Forbury Park in October. The evening was a great success, raising \$75,000, enough to fund FoodShare for several months and providing a wonderful meal for 220 guests.

On behalf of the highly engaged and hardworking board – Deborah Manning, Pieter Brits, Suneil Connor and myself – we thank all our donor and recipient organisations for their support, our volunteers and the FoodShare staff who make it happen every day.

Finally we thank Deborah for her leadership, energy and initiative as FoodShare and the wider group continue to go from strength to strength.

Whenever we explain what we do at FoodShare to someone who is not familiar with the term food rescue, it suddenly makes sense. They realise that by connecting fresh surplus food with people experiencing hunger we are using one problem to solve the other.

When they then learn that FoodShare delivered more than 280,000 kilograms of food, equivalent to 820,574 meals, in the last 12 months and with a value of more than \$2 million they are amazed. So, think about this: What would happen if our trucks were not on the roads every day? Over \$2 million of perfectly good food would go to waste and thousands of our vulnerable people in and around Dunedin would go hungry.

The people experiencing this food insecurity are parents who must choose between paying their rent and buying groceries, seniors struggling on fixed incomes, adults seeking counseling for mental health and addiction issues and children trying to concentrate at school when all they can think about is their empty stomach. Every one of them needs and deserves a healthy, nutritious meal.

Our trucks are out on the road rescuing fresh, surplus food Monday - Saturday and delivering it to our network of social service agencies. The food that we rescue is nutritious fruit, vegetables, meat, cheese, juice, milk and more. All this food would have otherwise gone to waste, and is donated by generous partners from supermarkets, manufacturers and distributers to cafes, bakeries and so on.

We have partnered with more than 50 social service agencies across the city who are providing crucial services to our most vulnerable people. These agencies run meal programs, food banks, shelters, children's breakfast and after school programs, community centers, drop-in centers, and centers for addiction or mental health.

This healthy food is served to a wide variety of people in need - women escaping domestic violence, newcomers to New Zealand, homeless adults and teens, adults fighting addiction, seniors struggling to live on fixed incomes and many others who are facing hard times. Their background and circumstances may be different, but they all share a common need - food.

There are two main benefits of food rescue - the social impact of feeding people in need and the environmental impact of keeping edible food out of landfill. While food rescue provides a mechanism for social improvement and prevents ecological damage there are also benefits to businesses who collaborate with us. Improved employee and customer satisfaction and enhanced credibility and authenticity from acting responsibility all increase an organisation's productivity and reputation. Ultimately, communities are strengthened when individuals are healthy and strong communities sustain local business.

Thank you to all the businesses who help us and to our food donors, our recipient partner agencies and our wonderful volunteers. Finally, the biggest thank you must go to the FoodShare team Pip, Al, Dan, Rae, Nicky and Christine. You are all food rescue champions who make the magic happen every day.



### New Zealand Food Rescue Group For the year ended 31 March 2017

#### Outcomes that the group is seeking to achieve:

The New Zealand Food Rescue Group believes that no one in our communities should go hungry.

All food donated to both Kiwi Harvest and FoodShare is given to people in the local communities of the respective local communities who don't have sufficient food.

We distribute the food we collect to select service agencies and community organisations who make sure all the food collected goes to those who truly need it.

With a focus on fresh fruit and vegetables, the food received by families and individuals in need makes a significant difference to their quality of life.

#### **Output Measures:**

For the year ended 31 March 2017, the Group delivered 1,452,706 meals for food insecure families and individuals in the Dunedin and Auckland area (2016: 790,422 meals delivered).

For the year ended 31 March 2017, the Group rescued and redistributed food worth an estimated total of \$5,084,470 that would have otherwise gone to waste (2016: \$2,766,477).

For the year ended 31 March 2017, the Group avoided 2 metric tonnes of carbon dioxide equivalent greenhouse gas emissions (2016: 1 metric tonne)

For the year ended 31 March 2017, the Group avoided the wastage of 53,895,382 litres of water. Equivalent to 22 Olympic size swimming pools (2016: 29,324,794).

For the year ended 31 March 2017, the Group avoided the wastage of 1,525,341 KW energy. Equivalent to 134 average New Zealand homes power consumption for 1 year (2016: 1,368,465).

### **Statement of Accounting Policies**

### New Zealand Food Rescue Group For the year ended 31 March 2017

#### STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements presented here are for the entity New Zealand Food Rescue Group, which is a Registered Charity. The Group comprises New Zealand Food Rescue Trust, FoodShare Limited, and Kiwi Harvest Limited. The accounting principles recognised as appropriate for the measurement and reporting of earnings and financial position on an historical cost basis have been used, with the exception of certain items for which specific accounting policies have been identified. As a Registered Charity, New Zealand Food Rescue Group was required to comply with the financial reporting framework for Tier 3 financial statements which has been developed by the External Reporting Board (The XRB).

All transactions are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The financial statements have been prepared on the assumption that the Group is a going concern.

### Property, Plant and Equipment

Items of property, plant or equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses (if any).

Where an item of property, plant or equipment is disposed of, the gain or loss recognised in the statement of financial performance is calculated as the difference between the sale price and the carrying amount of the asset.

#### Depreciation

Depreciation is charged as an expense at the same rate as allowed by the Income Tax Act 2007.

#### Revenue

Revenue is recorded in the period that it is earned. Grants received are recorded as income in the period when any conditions are fulfilled.

#### **Current Liabilities**

Current Liabilities represents liabilities for goods and services provided to the Group prior to the end of the financial year. These include salaries and wages accrued to balance date, annual leave earned but not taken at balance date.

#### **Goods and Services Tax**

The Group is registered for Goods and Services Tax (GST). All amounts are shown exclusive of (GST), except for receivables and payables, which are shown inclusive of GST.

#### Changes in Accounting Policies

The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous year.

#### 3. Contingencies and Commitments

The Group has no contingencies or comitments except a lease of premises at Central Park Corporate Estate, Auckland. This lease is for \$50,000 per year for 3 years commencing March 2017 (2016: nil). An agreement with Goodman Property Services (NZ) Limited will see a \$50,000 donation made to the Group per year for the same 3 year period to cover the cost of this lease.

#### 4. Related Parties

All related parties transactions occur within normal terms and condition. There were no significant related party transactions except within the 3 entities that comprise the Group.

For the year ended 31 March 2017 the parent entity of the Group, New Zealand Food Rescue Trust, reimbursed Food Share Limited \$111,043 (2016: \$168,590) and Kiwi Harvest Limited \$149,936 (2016: \$117,233) for expenses incurred and assets acquired in accordance with a service agreement. As these entries offset on consolidation, there is no impact on the Group figures. There are no amounts owing from Food-Share Limited and Kiwi Harvest Limited to New Zealand Food Rescue Trust as at 31 March 2017.

#### 5. Income Tax

As a Registered Charity, the Group is exempt from income tax.

#### 6. Events After the Balance Date

There were no significant events after the balance date that impacts these financial statements.

### **Our Qualified Opinion**

We have audited the consolidated financial statements of New Zealand Food Rescue Group (the 'Group'), which consists of New Zealand Food Rescue Trust, FoodShare Limited, and KiwiHarvest Limited. The consolidated financial statements comprises the statement of financial position as at 31 March 2017 and the statement of financial performance and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and the statement of accounting policies and other explanatory information.
