DAVID KIRK

Chair

The 2021 financial year, finishing on 31 March 2021, was of course the year of the COVID-19 shutdowns, and all manner of disruptions to everyday life. One consequence was a rapid and large increase in food insecurity in Aotearoa New Zealand.

Looking back, the collective response was amazing - food rescues, foodbanks, iwi, food donors, private funders and the government all playing their part in responding to what was a genuine crisis for many New Zealanders.

KiwiHarvest was well positioned to respond quickly with a new warehouse in Auckland already up and running. In 2021 KiwiHarvest rescued 2,114 tonnes of food, the equivalent to 6,040,274 meals - marking a massive 68% increase on 2020. Later in the year, with the help of Government funding (the first we have taken) we moved into a larger warehouse in Dunedin and into our first warehouses in Queenstown and the North Shore - with the latter continuing to flourish thanks (in part) to the strong support of North Shore Rotary Club.

Both revenue and costs grew substantially in 2021 - largely due (respectively) to more donations and the need to scale up to service growing demand, both as a result of the COVID-19 crisis. Revenue passed \$2 million in the year and costs grew by 87%. We have increased our reserves in 2021, but much of the revenue growth in the year was due to one-off contributions which will not be repeated, and we have determined we will need to manage our costs down in 2022 to ensure our sustainability and the maintenance of appropriate reserves.

We are once again very grateful to major donor the Goodman Foundation and to other financial donors for their ongoing support (special mention to the Ministry of Social Development for their two-year funding grant). In addition, one-off donations from Forsyth Barr, HelloFresh, Foodstuffs and Countdown were hugely welcome and allowed us to respond to the acute need during COVID-19 shutdowns.

My sincere thanks to the board of KiwiHarvest for their exceptional dedication during a very busy year. Every director has given up more time than would normally be expected to help us succeed in 2021, and KiwiHarvest has benefited enormously. We have maintained a small Board, which has allowed us to be nimble and effective in 2021, but we are likely to expand the Board by one or two in 2022.

Finally, a huge thanks to the wonderful KiwiHarvest team up and down the country and to our Founder Deborah, CEO Gavin and our former GM Blandina Diamond.

Ensuring everyone has access to healthy, nutritious food is one of the greatest challenges New Zealand faces as a nation.

COVID, COVID and more COVID.

Five days prior to the start of the 2021 financial year, the entire country went into Level 4 lockdown.

Whilst we anticipated that this may have an impact, both on how we would operate as a business and for our food insecure communities, we were in the dark as to just how long or deep the pandemic would run. Here we are a year later with COVID-19 still dominating the landscape.

As our Chairman has mentioned, many businesses stepped in to help us financially – enabling us to deliver over six million meal equivalents through our five branches nationwide.

I am extremely proud of the way all KiwiHarvest staff responded to the much-changed operational environment. Strict protocols around food handling and personal interactions did not deter the team from getting 68% more food out into our vulnerable communities compared to the previous year. Whilst we are unsure what the long term COVID-19 impact may be, our team are committed to and capable of delivering our much-needed service throughout Aotearoa New Zealand.

Our storage handling footprint increased significantly with the opening of warehouse facilities on the North Shore (of Auckland), Dunedin and Queenstown. In conjunction with continued improvement in our operational efficiencies and productivity, we are well set to meet the ongoing demands of supporting the organisations and community groups who are working at the frontline of New Zealand's food security issues.

Whilst our operation grew across the board (staff, fleet, footprint, deliverables), the current fiscal climate is one in which we must maintain our ability to manage our resources appropriately. I anticipate 2021/22 being a year of consolidation and marginal growth as we look to meet the "new norm", whatever that may be.

I look forward to partnering with Gavin, Deborah and the entire KiwiHarvest team, on our shared mission working towards the health and wellbeing of our communities, and our environment.

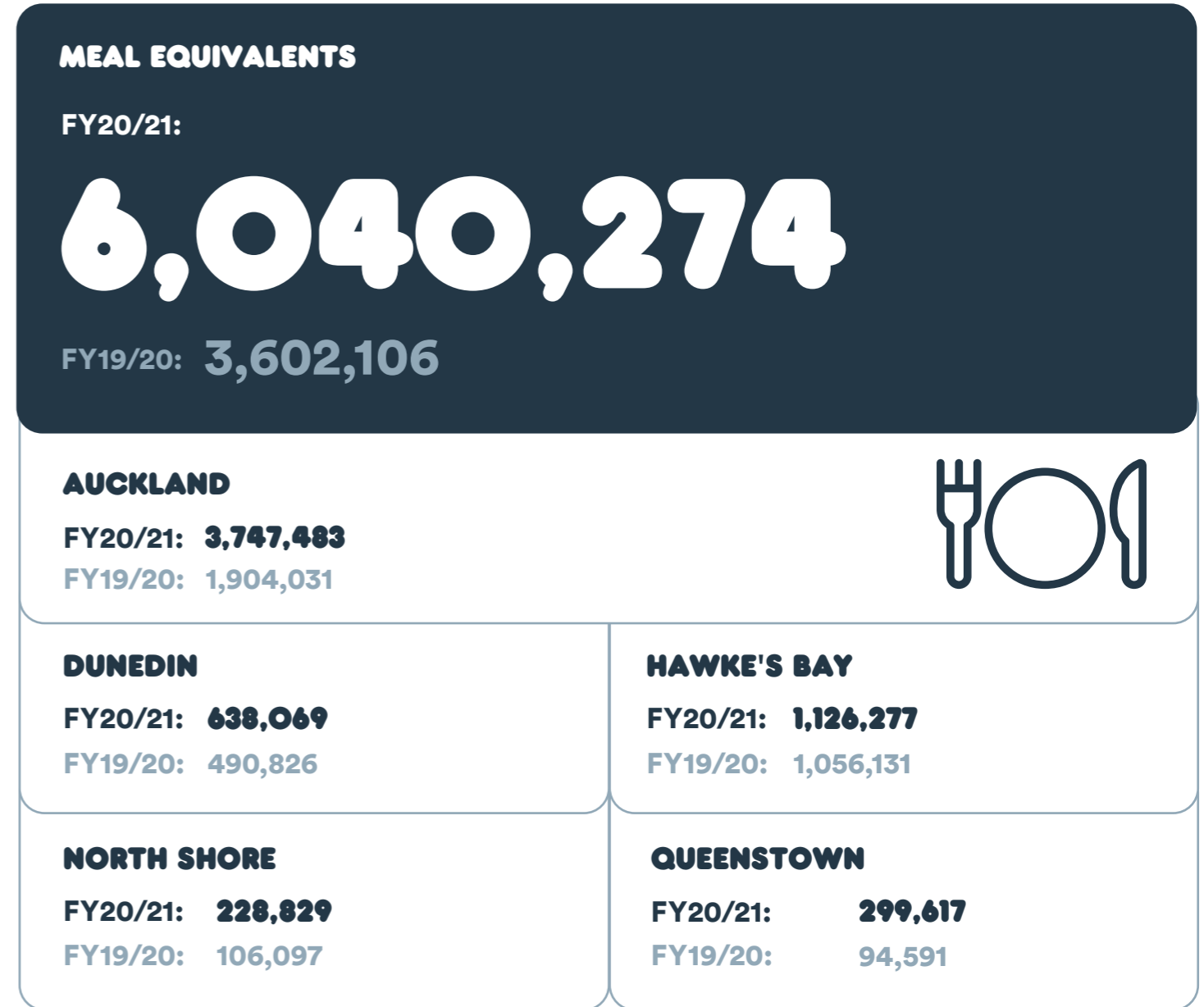
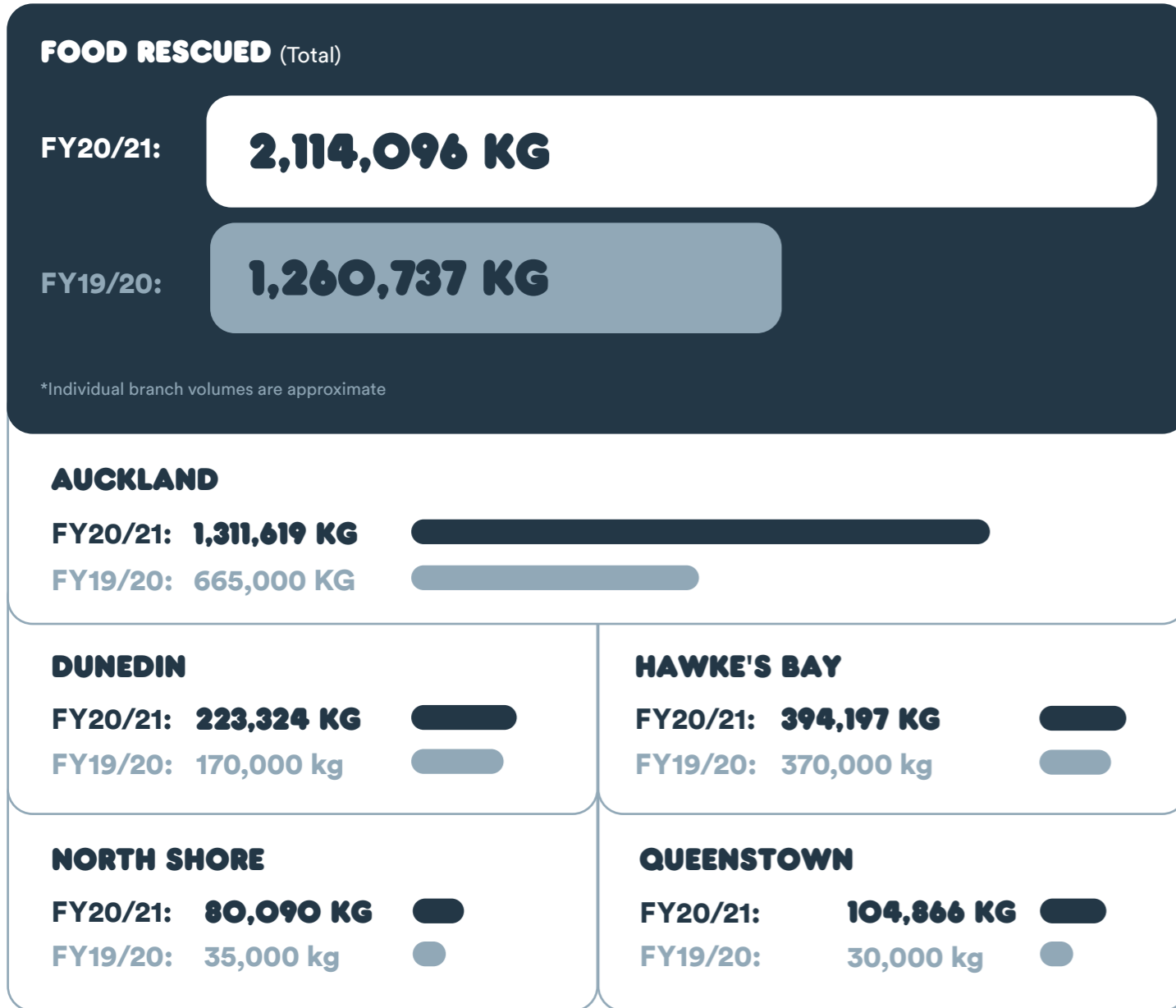
Together, it's our hope that all Kiwis will be able to experience the powerful nourishing and connecting benefits of food, each and every day.

The Year That's Been



AUCKLAND

Tāmaki Makaurau

Having operated right through New Zealand's nationwide lockdown (23rd March to 13th May 2020), our teams were well equipped to deal with any new challenges thrown our way – but when Auckland re-entered Alert Level 3 on August 12th, it was a shock to many of us! Not to mention lockdowns 3.0 and 4.0 in February and March 2021.

Under normal operations, our Auckland branch is powered by teams of volunteers (up to about 15 every week) who help us re-pack pallets of produce into 15 kilogram bags and boxes, that are more manageable for our recipient agencies. During Alert Levels 3 and 4, however, we were unable to open our doors to these invaluable members of the extended KiwiHarvest family.

A number of our core team generously stepped up to fill the gap (including our drivers Seti, Peter, Gary, Daniel, and our North Shore branch manager Janice), each spending a few hours packing each morning, in addition to their usual roles. We're incredibly grateful for their immense dedication (and that of all members of our team), helping us to get food out the door to families in need during this time of crisis.

During the August lockdown, we were also proud to partner with our sister organisation, the New Zealand Food Network, to assist with the distribution of more than one million face masks (provided by the Ministry of Social Development). Over the course of a single week, we helped to distribute 77,500 masks to a number of our recipient agencies and community groups throughout the Auckland region.

We were also delighted to welcome a number of new team members – including drivers, warehouse and office staff – helping to make a greater difference to communities in need.

NORTH SHORE

It's been a big year of growth for the team at KiwiHarvest North Shore.

With the advent of COVID-19 we (like every other food support organisation around New Zealand) saw a dramatic increase in demand for our services, which meant we needed to grow rapidly in order to support families in need throughout our local communities.

Over the last year, we've expanded our operations from three to five days a week, which – along with our new full-time driver, larger delivery vehicle and ongoing support from our mighty team of volunteers – has allowed us to better serve the rising number of local families living with food insecurity.

In early 2021, we also made the move from our old premises (our home since we first opened in 2017) to brand new warehouse facilities in Rosedale. The move marked a significant upgrade in terms of both capacity and capability, and allowed us to bring greater efficiency to the work we do.

Combined, these changes enabled us to rescue 80,090 kilograms of food, the equivalent of 228,828 meals between April 2020 and March 2021, a figure up almost 128% from the previous year's 35,000 kilograms.

We continue to be immensely proud and humbled to be part of an organisation that is helping so many people and creating change in their lives for the better.





HAWKE'S BAY

Te Matau-a-Māui

FY 20/21 marked the final year of operation for KiwiHarvest's Hawke's Bay branch, which closed in March 2021 after serving local communities for nearly three years.

After opening our doors in October 2018, we welcomed our Hawke's Bay branch coordinator, Jane Nicholson, on board in September 2019 – whose deep connections throughout the region were invaluable in building key relationships with local food donors and recipients.

Together with a team of 12 dedicated volunteers (and many others), Jane was responsible for all aspects of our operation – including pick-ups, packing and unpacking, and deliveries. Over the last three years, KiwiHarvest Hawke's Bay is proud to have rescued 960,483 kilos of food the equivalent to 2,744,237 meals.

Our sister organisation, the New Zealand Food Network, is set to establish a Hawke's Bay distribution centre in late 2021 – ensuring that communities in need throughout the region can continue to access crucial food support. Vehicles and other equipment from our Hawke's Bay branch have been redeployed to enable our team around the country to better support other areas of need.

QUEENSTOWN

Tahuna

In September 2020 we were proud to open the doors of our brand new KiwiHarvest Queenstown branch. Having previously operated out of our former branch coordinator's home (thank you Lucy!) the new space has given us a more substantial on-the-ground presence that has allowed us to significantly bolster the services we've been providing throughout the region since October 2018.

As a community largely dependent on the tourism sector, Queenstown and its surrounding areas have felt the impact of COVID-19 more harshly than many other parts of the country, with ongoing border closures leading to heightened levels of food deprivation.

The new warehouse (outfitted with chillers, freezers and a new truck) has enabled us to extend our reach, making a difference to new service groups throughout Queenstown that were previously overlooked, as well as further afield into Cromwell and Wanaka.

Under the leadership of our new team members – branch manager Kayleigh Simons-Smith, and driver and food rescue hero Mel Wright – the Queenstown branch rescued 104,866 kilograms of food throughout the community during the past financial year. This marked a 249% increase from the 30,000kg rescued during the previous 12-month period.



DUNEDIN

Ōtepoti

Having operated out of the same premises since we first opened as FoodShare more than nine years ago – comprised of a tiny office and sorting room we'd long since grown out of – 2020 became the year our Dunedin branch upgraded to a brand new warehouse.

With approximately 360m² of floor space, the new warehouse has enabled our operations to be outfitted for the first time with reefers, racking, and a forklift, so we can now receive larger pallets of donated and rescued goods, to redistribute further out into the local community.

In the months since we made the move, we're proud to have extended our reach to communities throughout the wider Otago region, including Oamaru, Balclutha and Alexandra.

Like many other regions, Otago has seen an overwhelming rise in demand for food assistance across the region, which has been reflected in an increase in food quantities distributed via the KiwiHarvest Dunedin warehouse. For the year to March 2021, Dunedin has rescued 223,324kgs of food in the local community - up nearly 31% from 170,000kgs the previous full year.

We'd like to take the opportunity to thank our volunteers for the help with the move in, Roy and Daniel for donating the furniture in the office spaces, and the awesome lads with the forklift from next door who helped us move the reefers into place.



HIGHLIGHTS

& Key Moments

THE IMPACT OF COVID-19

When New Zealand was placed into our nation-wide lockdown on 25th March 2020, the impact for those across the food support ecosystem was immense.

With many Kiwis facing significant disruption to their financial situation as a result of lockdown-related redundancies and reduced hours, demand for food support rose sharply – placing added pressure on our services (and those of other organisations like ours) already struggling to keep up with demand.

As the panic-buying trend saw supermarket shelves left bare (and staff run off their feet) this vital source of food donations dried up – remaining low even once limits were put in place to curb excess buying of certain items. Thankfully, however, we saw a surge in donations from across the hospitality sector, including restaurants and their supply chains, as they prepared to close for Alert Level 4.

Overall, since the 1st March 2020, KiwiHarvest has onboarded 39 new food donors, and 22 new recipient agencies, showcasing not only the critical need for the services we provide – but also the immense generosity and willingness to help from food sector businesses across the country.

We are incredibly grateful for the ongoing support of our partners, and our wonderful team, enabling us to meet this growing need.



PROJECT WHAKARAHİ

As you'll know by now, it's been a significant year of growth, movement and change for all of our branches – particularly with the series of upgrades and expansions to our teams, premises, operations and capabilities that has been rolled out across the country.

This project, known internally Project Whakarahi, has been made possible through the generosity and support of the Ministry of Social Development, and has enabled us to:

- Dunedin – relocate our branch from its original facilities, where we'd been since 2012, to a new warehouse with more space and greater capabilities; and purchase two new containers (one chilled, one frozen) and a brand new forklift!
- Queenstown – establish our first ever warehouse (complete with reefers, racking, an office and forklift) and expand the team with two new hires.
- North Shore – move and settle into our brand new warehouse facility.

Thank you to our partners at the Ministry of Social Development for their ongoing support, enabling us to make an even greater difference to communities in need around the country.



PARTNERING WITH COUNTDOWN

Countdown are incredibly passionate about sustainability and the environment, and have set a bold (and admirable) target of producing zero food waste across their entire supply chain, which they're striving to meet in a number of ways.

Having refined their forecasting methods to help predict consumer demand as accurately as possible, they also now partner with over 12 food rescue organisations around the country to ensure any surplus food can make a positive difference to communities in need.

KiwiHarvest's partnership with Countdown spans all the way back to 2013, when our operations were based solely in Dunedin. The relationship has grown over the years and we're now proud (and grateful) to be one of those 12 key partners of their official food rescue programme.

In addition to being an invaluable food donor, Countdown supports us in a raft of other ways – providing funding for a dedicated KiwiHarvest account manager, a new truck and a driver. These changes have allowed us to increase the number of Countdown stores we collect from throughout Auckland (from 17 to 39), reach new areas for both collections and distributions, and increase the number of overall collections being made.

Quantities of food rescued through Countdown have grown significantly in the last year, thanks to growing awareness and the number of stores participating. In April 2020, we collected 15,170 kilograms of food across our store partnerships – a figure which had grown to 26,574kg in October 2020, or the equivalent of 75,925 meals! All in all, donations from Countdown equate to approximately 14% of all food we receive, including 18% of produce and 30% of meat.

We would like to make special mention of Countdown's Penrose e-Store which (while collections were placed on hold during Auckland's March 2021 COVID-19 lockdown) continued to freeze meat for us – which meant two full pallets worth of meat for us to collect once restrictions lifted! Additionally, thanks to Mt Eden for thinking of us when they had a massive surplus of 1,700 eggs, which could otherwise have ended up in landfill.

We owe a debt of gratitude to Countdown, and its staff, for their continued service, generosity and hard work – and the difference they're helping to make for our environment, and our communities.

RESCUE THE FLAVOUR

In late 2020, we had the immense pleasure of partnering with AUT's Culinary Arts school, to deliver a very special event, **Rescue the Flavour**, as a final class project for their third year Bachelors' students.

The students chose the night's theme of 'Rescued Food' with the aim of starting a discussion that would help improve food literacy, and reduce food wastage. Naturally, we were delighted to jump on board.

The delicious three-course dinner, held at AUT's Four Seasons restaurant, featured a main dish made exclusively from food rescued via KiwiHarvest – showcasing the beauty and taste of ingredients which were once destined for landfill. Our CEO, Gavin Findlay, was honoured to have the chance to speak (between courses) to the work that's being done across the food rescue industry.

All proceeds from the ticket sales for the event went to KiwiHarvest, with an additional \$380 raised from guest donations.

We couldn't be prouder of Hon and his team for the hard work they put in to deliver a wonderful evening - and grateful for the learning they had completed to understand food waste in New Zealand, and the desire to share that knowledge with others.

Special thanks as well to Mt Michael Wines, for their donations of some lovely 2018 Pinot Noir – and the familiar faces who attended from our supporters Countdown, One Plus One Communications, Salesforce, and CHEP.

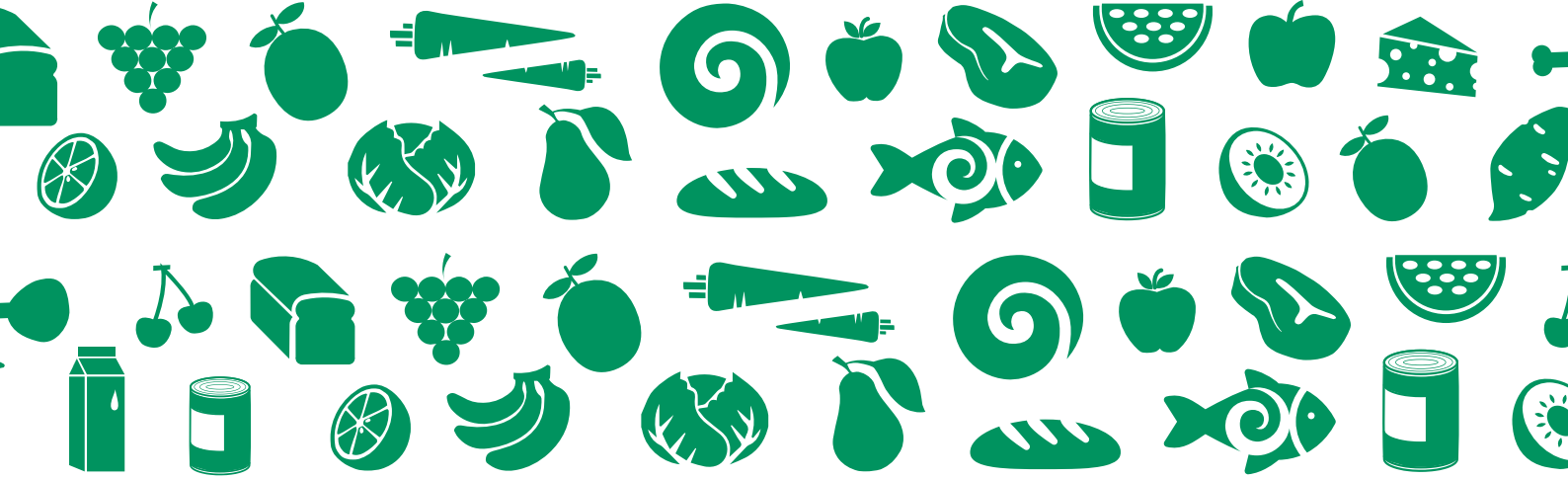
