# DAVID KIRK

## Chairman



**The 2022 financial year was another year of extraordinary dedication and service by the KiwiHarvest teams to deliver much needed food to food-insecure New Zealanders in Invercargill, Queenstown, Dunedin, central and south Auckland, the North Shore and other northern districts of Greater Auckland.**

As I noted in last year's Annual Report, because of the community and government response to COVID-19 revenue grew strongly in 2021 and KiwiHarvest expanded in response to the growth in need. I also noted in last year's report that much of the revenue growth in 2021 was one-off in nature and that revenue would decline in 2022. This has proved to be the case. Revenue in 2022 was down by 23% compared to 2021. I also noted in last year's report that we would need to manage our costs down in 2022. Our costs in 2022, however, were ahead of 2021. This was a result of new warehouse leases entered into and more staff employed part-way through 2021 continuing for a full year in 2022. Nevertheless, KiwiHarvest delivered an operating profit of \$15,858 in 2022.

MSD grants over the COVID-19 period provided an important source of revenue in 2022 and these have now ceased. We are now focused on revenue growth from other sources and careful cost management to ensure KiwiHarvest remains profitable and can fund asset replacement costs.

We remain very grateful to our Founding Donor, the Goodman Foundation, and to other major donors Countdown, Jasmine Social Investments, Rabobank, Subway New Zealand and the Rotary Club of Downtown Auckland.

My thanks again to my fellow directors on the board of KiwiHarvest for their wonderful contributions in another very busy year. Early in the 2023 financial year we were delighted to welcome Debbie Peri to the board.

Finally, huge thanks to the wonderful KiwiHarvest teams up and down the country and especially to our founder Deborah Manning and CEO Gavin Findlay.

# DEBORAH MANNING

## Founder



**People often think of food support as something that is there in case of an emergency, but the reality is that in New Zealand it has become a chronic need for many.**

**Like 2020, this last year has been challenging for many families, reflecting the impact of COVID-19. One in five Kiwi kids are living in households where food runs out sometimes or often, and since 2019, it's estimated the number of Kiwis living without reliable access to affordable, nutritious food has doubled to hit one million.**

Food insecurity doesn't exist in isolation – being malnourished ripples across a person's life. It affects not just their quality of life but their health. People who are food insecure suffer increased incidences of acute and chronic health problems like asthma and diabetes, dental problems, as well as social isolation and more frequent visits to hospital for children.

This year, the cost of vegetables shot up by 7.6%, making it even harder for people to access sufficient nutrition. This jump was the largest in a decade and along with supply chain issues for supermarkets, has had knock-on effects on the levels of donations KiwiHarvest receives.

COVID-19 has had a significant impact on our services. Like other food rescue organisations, KiwiHarvest is an essential service provider and operated under all alert levels. Lockdowns caused surges in demand and meant our valued volunteers couldn't assist us, so the workload for our core team increased, making it harder to get nutritious food to families when they needed it most. Despite this, the team's performance was exceptional as they juggled working from home, rotation bubbles and additional health and safety measures. No mean feat!

We are thankful for the helping hand provided by the Ministry for Social Development (MSD), which stepped up to assist food insecure communities during the pandemic. MSD supported KiwiHarvest and other food provision organisations with additional funding to help people access food in the Auckland region and beyond.

We're also so grateful for the continued support from our major donors and our wonderful volunteers.

Finally, my sincere thanks to the entire KiwiHarvest whanau: funders, food donors, in-kind supporters, the Board, team and volunteers. As the saying goes, many hands make light work, and that's true for the collective action needed to address food insecurity.

# GAVIN FINDLAY

## CEO



Off the back of a tumultuous, COVID-19-induced year, we entered 2021/22 with renewed hope - we were settling back into Level 1 and coming to terms with what a “new normal” would be.

Throughout the year, there were large spikes and troughs in food supply as the domestic and worldwide supply chains were put under extreme pressure. That’s why I’m endlessly proud of how our teams continually adapted to this environment and the changing restrictions that came with working under the Alert Level (and then traffic light) system. Whilst the demand for food support remained high (and skyrocketed when Omicron hit), KiwiHarvest staff rose to the challenge and supported the hundreds of thousands of Kiwis in need.

As our Founder, Deborah Manning, has mentioned, I would also like to endorse the significant support provided by the Ministry for Social Development (MSD). In creating a strong platform of engagement and support, MSD allows KiwiHarvest (and other food rescue organisations) to deliver much needed, and ever-increasing services to vulnerable communities.

As mentioned, strains on the supply chain meant the volumes of rescuable (and donated) food were reduced over the course of the year. We will continue to monitor the volumes of available surplus food and scale our operation accordingly through our footprint and storage capacity.

It’s still unclear as to when the fallout of the pandemic will settle, but as we push forward into 2022, inflation continues to rise and contribute to the hardship faced by many households. With the fantastic support of our existing partners and sponsors, KiwiHarvest is in a strong position, both financially and operationally, to meet these challenges head on. As a leader in our field, we will continue to explore opportunities for growth and collaboration to ensure we can lift up the many great organisations throughout the nation who are working to create a more food secure Aotearoa New Zealand.

# PETER GORDON

## Ambassador



I’ve spent the majority of my adult life living overseas, creating and then plating delicious New Zealand kai on the world stage. Two years ago, just before the pandemic caused our first lockdown, I returned to Aotearoa with my partner Alastair. The impact on growers, fishers, farmers and producers of broken trade routes, and the rising cost of food, had us embark on setting up a unique space to promote local, sustainable kai, sharing our favourite recipes and teaching people to cook. In November 2020, our vision became a reality, and we opened the doors to Homeland, a food embassy and social enterprise.

As a food business owner, the past years have certainly been challenging – from lockdowns and COVID-19 restrictions, to disrupted supply chains and staff shortages caused by the pandemic. Despite these immense obstacles, we have managed to stick to our principles and employ almost 40 staff.

# AUCKLAND

**Our Auckland Branch was at the centre of the 2021 COVID-19 lockdowns where demand for food skyrocketed, we supported 115 recipient agencies in the region alone.**

Our volunteers are an integral part of our operation in Auckland. In the last financial year, over 90 volunteers consisting of individuals and corporate groups provided hands-on support. During the August-November 2021 lockdown, we couldn't host volunteers on-site in order to minimise our team's exposure to the virus. While our entire team stepped in, we gained a deep appreciation for our volunteers who continue to generously give up their time and help us every day.

We attended events including the Auckland Food Show and National Fieldays with Rabobank, which helped us spread our message and raise awareness of the important work we are doing in the community.

Auckland has 135 food donors who continue to support our mahi by donating surplus and gifted stock. At the beginning of the August 2021 lockdown, we saw a surge in donations as many businesses had to close their doors abruptly. These donations began to slow down due to delays in the supply chain and stores remaining closed or with reduced hours.

We have unfortunately said farewell to a couple of team members over the last year who have shown great commitment to the organisation and for which we are very grateful. However, we are excited to have welcomed some new faces and look forward to seeing what the next year has in store for the branch. We are incredibly thankful for our team, for adapting to the ever-changing environment – their hands-on mahi, dedication, and resilience has provided much-needed support to many struggling Aucklanders.





# DUNEDIN

The past year has really highlighted the difference KiwiHarvest Dunedin can make for communities throughout Otago. COVID-19 restrictions, increased food donations and inflated need for our service have seen the Dunedin team put through its paces.

Challenging times have been met with a combined sense of purpose and strengthened relationships with food donors and recipients. We continued to build on our understanding of need within our communities, forging new bonds around Dunedin city, South to the Clutha District and North to the Waitaki District and the Maniototo. This expansion provides much-needed food assistance to hundreds of families in some of the South's more remote regions.

Plumped-up food volumes also squeezed our operational space, so in October 2021, we installed a large walk-in chiller room that can handle pallets. This adds work-space efficiency and saves a tonne of manual handling.

KiwiHarvest Dunedin redistributed 239,047 kgs of good, nutritious food into Otago communities over the year – the equivalent of 682,991 meals!

None of this would have been possible without the incredible efforts of our food donors, the KiwiHarvest Dunedin staff, Susie Townshend, Rae De Haan, Allan Croad, Christine Greer and Dan Mulvey, and our tireless core of volunteers.



# NORTH SHORE



2021 was an intense and challenging year for many including KiwiHarvest in the food rescue space. At the start of 2021 we moved into our new warehouse and were grateful to receive a new refrigerated truck via our partnership with the Ministry for the Environment.

Demand for food dominated the lives of our 25 recipient agencies and we are proud to say that our team on the North Shore weren't afraid to get their hands dirty, and stepped up to meet that need to the best of their ability. Processing more donations in 2021 than ever before and delivering good nutritious food from our door to our recipient's door.

We saw a decline in the incoming stock from our supermarket partners due to COVID-19 and Supply Chain issues. The support from MSD via the New Zealand Food Network (NZFN) alleviated those pressures. NZFN is now an important partner to KiwiHarvest North Shore as we strive to meet the elevated demand.

Lockdown meant that we were unable to welcome our invaluable volunteers on site. They were very much missed and we appreciate their dedication to our cause now more than ever, after four months of being without them.

During this period, the role of the Ministry of Social Development became more significant with its associated funding to NZFN and food hubs directly. In total, the North Shore branch delivered 122,612 kgs of food - the equivalent of 350,320 meals.

At the end of the financial year both Daniel and Janice left the North Shore branch. They will be missed and KiwiHarvest are forever grateful for the help they have given us in forming, running and developing KiwiHarvest North Shore. We wish them the best!

# QUEENSTOWN



As the nation continued to battle with the effects on our communities from COVID-19, the Queenstown branch was proud to be able to continue to operate and provide nutritious kai to those in need during all alert levels and lockdowns.

As challenging as some of the year was, the Queenstown Branch managed to land some wins too! Firstly, our inaugural fundraising event, 'Less Waste More Taste', took place in November. We teamed up with our friends at Sustainable Queenstown and a few socially-conscious chefs from iconic local eateries (shout out to Halo and Hustl!) to put together a night of delicious food, a silent auction and a table quiz. The feedback was overwhelmingly positive, and we are planning for bigger and better in 2022.

2021 also saw us launch our first-of-its-kind E-bike powered 'Food Rescue Ride' with funding raised through the QLDC Waste Minimisation Fund. The E-bike, with its accompanying trailer, is a volunteer-led program that enabled us to start a café and bakery collection run thrice weekly in the Queenstown CBD. The response has been exceptional from cafés, and the food goes down extremely well with our recipients.

KiwiHarvest Queenstown rescued almost 84,000 kgs of good food from landfills, equating to nearly a quarter of a million meals to the community, a tremendous effort for our team.

# INVERCARGILL

After a year of planning, KiwiHarvest is finally in Invercargill, making an impact in the Southland region. The branch launched in early August 2021 and hit the ground running. Jessie Beer, our Invercargill branch manager, launched the operation using her personal vehicle and garage, generously supported by Bidfood.

The initial plan was to move slow and steady, but due to the impact of COVID-19, the operation grew significantly quicker than anyone had imagined. Four weeks in and Jessie was able to hire a Food Rescue Driver and hero, Junaya Leask. They created strong relationships with donors, recipients, and the wider community support networks, enabling the operation to be a great success.

Over eight months, the Invercargill Branch distributed 92,117kgs of kai into the Southland region, the equivalent of 263,191 meals.

Since then, the Invercargill team have moved into a warehouse, been sponsored a new van by Kelliher Charitable Trust, and hired another casual worker, Melissa.

We couldn't be prouder of how far the team has come in this short amount of time and are grateful for the ongoing support from volunteers for all their hard mahi over this period. It has allowed us to better serve the rising number of people living with food insecurity in the Invercargill region – providing more than just a hand-out, but a sense of hope for the future.

The team are passionate and looking forward to growing the branch over the next year, having made an invaluable impact already.

# RABOBANK AND NATIONAL FIELDDAYS

Rabobank are long-standing supporters of KiwiHarvest and a Major Sponsor.

Thanks to our partnership, we had the opportunity to attend the Southern Hemisphere's largest agricultural event, National Fieldays, at Hamilton Mystery Creek in June.

We joined Rabobank with our branded trailer (generously sponsored by The Rotary Club of Downtown Auckland and Countdown) to share tips and tricks on reducing food waste and raise awareness of our work in this space.

It was great to see Rabobank engage with their clients about its efforts to become more commercially and environmentally sustainable, lifting up rural communities and reducing food waste via its partnership with KiwiHarvest.

The Rabobank team was fantastic and volunteered on our stand to help spread the KiwiHarvest message among Fieldays attendees.

As part of the four-day event, Prime Minister, Jacinda Ardern announced the Rabobank-KiwiHarvest Food Waste Survey findings during a special morning tea at the Rabobank marquee.

Todd Charteris, Chief Executive at Rabobank NZ, says, "Our mission is all about 'Growing a better New Zealand together.' That's what our partnership with KiwiHarvest is all about.

"Our partnership with KiwiHarvest is a perfect fit for Rabobank. It builds on our shared values around sustainable food production, community engagement and thought leadership on the vitally important issue of reducing food waste at a time when many Kiwi families do not have enough food on the table. Importantly for us, our partnership with KiwiHarvest provides our employees with a valuable opportunity to contribute through our community volunteer days and supporting KiwiHarvest at public events."





## BATTLE OF THE SUITS

In May, Rotary Club of Downtown Auckland (RCODA) held its biennial Battle of the Suits fundraising event. With over 450 attendees in Auckland's stunning Cordis Hotel, the black-tie dinner, debate and auction was truly a night to remember – not to mention the inspiring speech from KiwiHarvest Founder, Deborah Manning. Through ticket sales and auction items, the event raised an impressive \$70,000 for KiwiHarvest.

Christine Fenby, President of RCODA (2021-22), says “KiwiHarvest first came to the attention of the Rotary Club of Downtown Auckland through one of our members a few years ago. The rapid escalation in numbers of New Zealanders suffering varying degrees of compromised food security and the brilliant food rescue and distribution solution conceived and implemented by Deborah Manning and her team was and is, a privilege for Downtown to support. Therefore, it was an easy decision to make KiwiHarvest the beneficiary of our 2021 ‘Battle of the Suits’ Black Tie Dinner and Debate charitable event.

“We also wanted to help KiwiHarvest grow their public profile - especially given the philanthropic capability and empathy of our ‘Battle of the Suits’ audience. A stunned silence prevailed in the Cordis Hotel Ballroom when Deborah delivered key statistics; if there was a star in the room that evening - it was KiwiHarvest. As a community service organisation we couldn't have been more delighted.”



## FOOD FOR GOOD

It's been all systems go, with KiwiHarvest drivers making an impressive 7,614 stops at Countdown stores over the past 12 months - an increase of 47% per week on the previous period. We rescued over 316,000kg of food in the process, the equivalent of more than 905,000 meals going into our local communities.

Countdown also donated surplus bricks from their popular November-December children's promotion, which we happily passed onto hospitals, youth groups and women's refuges.

In early 2022, Countdown officially opened its second Green Star certified store in Tāmaki Makaurau (Waiata Shores), highlighting its commitment to leading the way in sustainability.

KiwiHarvest collects from 50 Countdown stores across Aotearoa. We're grateful that Countdown sponsored us with a truck and driver to best service these pick-ups and deliveries. We look forward to increasing and broadening our collections even more, and the positive impact made on our local communities.
