



# KIWI HARVEST 2023 ANNUAL REPORT



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# DAVID KIRK

## Chairman



Revenue grew by 7.6% in the year to over \$2 million for the first time. This was unexpected. In particular we had expected MSD funding of the food rescue sector to decline in 2023 compared to 2022, but such was the need funding was increased. It is now clear funding from MSD to the sector will be decline significantly in 2024. We are planning appropriately for this.

In 2023 we have invested in new resources to support future growth. Our wonderful CEO Angela Calver completed her first full year leading the organisation and we added Jennifer Stephens as our relationship manager and Anne-Marie Friis as head of marketing and fund-raising. Both have proved to be great additions to the KiwiHarvest team.

In 2023 we recorded an operating deficit of \$141,006, and a cash surplus of \$34,133. The difference between the two numbers is almost all depreciation, for which we need to provide and thus we focus on the operating deficit as the best measure of our financial performance in the year.

We have very healthy cash reserves of \$833,227 (up by the above \$34,133 in the year) but remain focused on producing a breakeven operating performance each year. We are working hard to fill the gap left by the MSD funding reduction and our increased cost base.

A huge thank you to our wonderful donors, without which we simply couldn't do what we do: founding supporter the Goodman Foundation, and major financial donors Countdown, Rabobank and Jasmine Social Investments.

My thanks again to my fellow directors for their dedication and commitment in giving their time and energy to KiwiHarvest: Debbie Peri, Suzanne O'Leary, Suneil Connor and Deborah Manning. It is a delight to work with you all.

Finally, a huge thank you to the KiwiHarvest teams across the country, to our volunteers and especially to our Founder Deborah Manning and CEO Angela Calver for their leadership of all that we do.

**Another busy and challenging year has passed very quickly for us all. Some may have thought with the years of Covid disruption and associated hardships behind us we would see a decline in food insecurity in New Zealand in 2023. Sadly, this is not the case.**

**The number of New Zealanders who do not have access to adequate daily nutritious food has continued to grow.**

**The five KiwiHarvest branches collectively distributed 1,994,291 kgs of food in 2023. This was an increase of 11.2% on the 1,792,929 kgs distributed in 2022.**

**Our dedicated, creative and tireless teams up and down the country have done a wonderful job.**

## CEO



**As I sit and start to write this commentary for the last year, we have just experienced the Auckland floods and cyclone Gabrielle.**

**The KiwiHarvest Auckland team have been amazing in responding to the flooding at Countdown Mairangi Bay and we have worked with MPI to have the protocols around food that has been touched by floodwater amended.**

**This change will ensure that this product will not go to landfill in the future.**

**I have every confidence that the team will do what is needed to support the communities that have been hit hard by the floods and Cyclone Gabrielle.**

**I have been heartened by the additional support offered by some key funders so that we can quickly get much needed fresh produce out to the various areas around Auckland.**

Besides my personal thanks, there are many many individuals and families who extend their thanks for your generosity.

To say that the last year has gone by in a whirlwind doesn't seem right at the moment, but it has. After taking up the position of GM in April 22 I set about understanding the various facets of KiwiHarvest, how we best serve our various stakeholders and set a foundation for our future. A key step forward was re-defining how the team all over the country viewed KiwiHarvest, our Mahi and how we bring our values into everyday life at KiwiHarvest. We have also worked through the creation of a strategic plan that has called out the work streams necessary for us to achieve doubling our volumes by 2025.

2022 has seen some settling back into life post Covid lockdowns and we have been so very happy to welcome back our volunteers; helping to sort and repack bulk product and with our drivers out on their routes. In the last year we have had over 6000 hours of volunteer help. As I say to each group of volunteers that I sit down with to share a coffee, "we really couldn't get through all the work we do without you". So, from me, a heartfelt thanks to each and every one of you!

The appointment of a relationship manager to work with our recipient agencies has meant we have been able to do a full audit of all Auckland recipient agencies. This audit gives us the base information to understand all of the services the agencies offer, how we best support them and deliver our product to them so that it reaches their clients in the best possible condition.

Our last financial year saw KiwiHarvest put the equivalent of close to 5,700,000 meals out into the community at a cost of 39cents per meal. This is a growth in volume of product rescued and redistributed of 11% over FY2022 and really showcases the whole New Zealand team's dedication to finding new sources of food donation so we can best support the communities we operate in. Proud.

A valued financial investor told me shortly after I started with KiwiHarvest that we needed to diversify our income streams and tell our story better. We have worked not only at a board level but also within each branch to be able to achieve this sage advice. The support from MSD over the Covid years has been appreciated and has allowed KiwiHarvest to go from an organisation processing approx. 1 million kgs of rescued product per year to 2 million kgs. However, the signals are that, this support will not continue past 2022. With that in mind in January we appointed a Head of Fundraising and Marketing.

This pivotal position will help KiwiHarvest to identify and professionally manage our applications for funds and be able to clearly articulate the fund's impact in the community.

We really appreciate the current support we receive from all those organisations and individuals that kindly donate/ grant funds to KiwiHarvest. You do a good thing!

In rounding out I want to personally thank our founder Deb Manning, for her vision in creating an amazing organisation, her support of me in taking up this position and I also extend those thanks to the board of KiwiHarvest. I appreciate your guidance and the support you offer our organisation.

Looking forward to the year to come working with the dedicated team here at KiwiHarvest.

## FOUNDATIONS FOR GROWTH:

- This past year has seen a strong focus on recovery from the Covid years, and laying the groundwork for us to achieve our planned growth target to double our volumes by FY25
- People – we have worked to get the right people in place for the operation to grow – both in the branches and at admin level. In particular recruiting of our new CEO and the new role of Head of Fundraising and Marketing, both critical to achieve funding for planned growth.
- Processes – there was focus on setting up good process to enable growth – updating of all policies, structure & guidelines for sponsorships, procedures with food donors (especially Countdown), documentation and improved understanding of all recipient charities.
- Plans – a Strategic Plan for Growth and a Fundraising and Marketing Plan have been documented.
- Finances – funding critical to enable growth is our key challenge, and we recognise the need to diversify our income streams. The key concern is around government support which has been very significant during the last 3 covid affected years. We go into FY24 with major uncertainty about the level of government support, without this support growth will be a major challenge.
- Relationships – we have worked on key relationships with food donors, our funders (corporate, grants and government), suppliers, volunteers and our recipient charities. A Relationships Manager (Recipients) was appointed to focus on our recipient agencies, our Relationship Manager (Donors) continues to work with our food donors and in particular Countdown. Our Head of Fundraising focuses on corporate sponsors, grantees and public donor's and our CEO manages relationships with Industry partners and government.
- Our strategic plan is to double our volumes by 2025

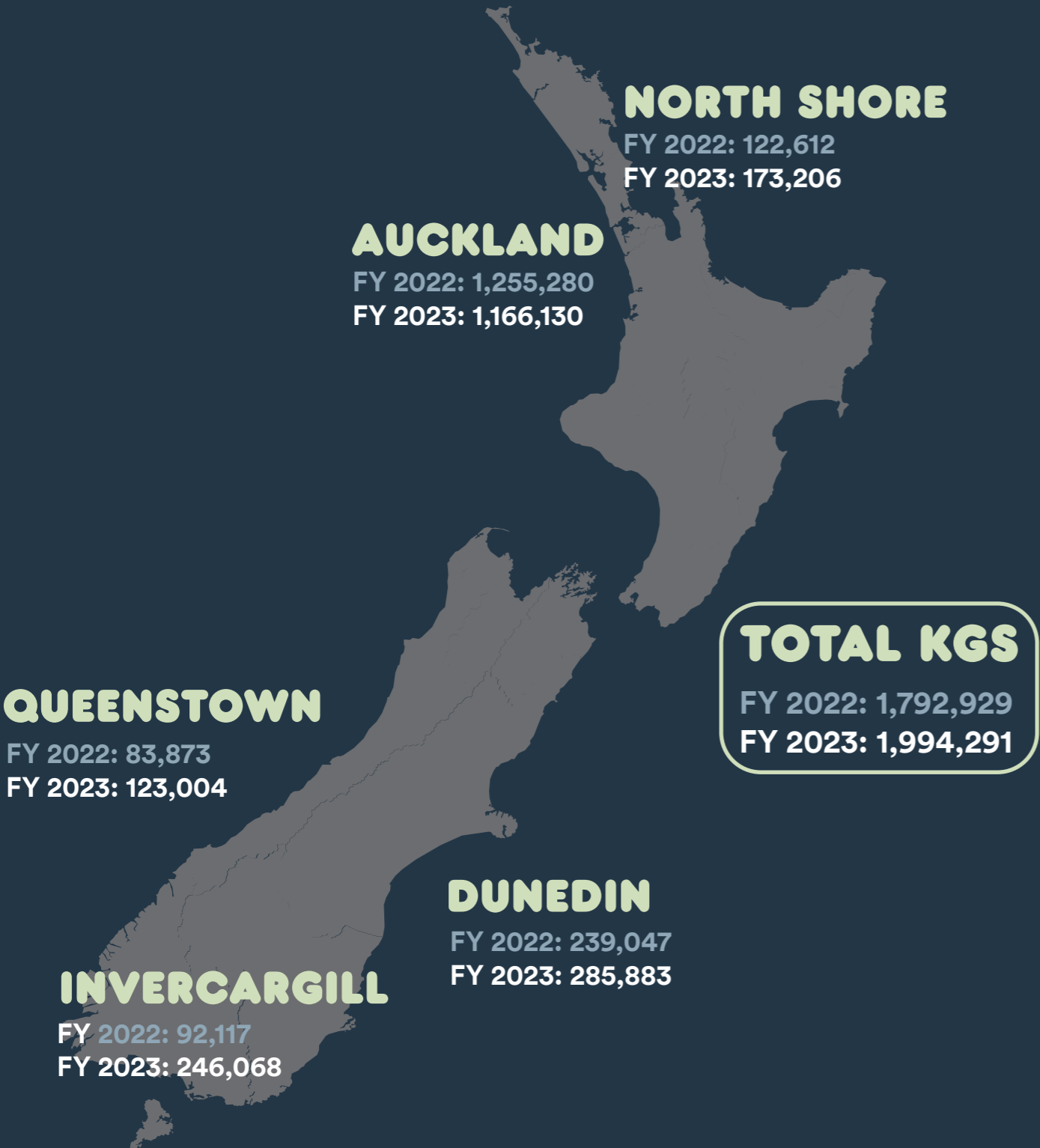

# AUCKLAND

(Highbrook & North Shore)

## Sustainability

The past year has been successful but also challenging with the devastating weather events that occurred over the summer. Whilst this has brought unprecedented challenges for many in our community, we've been amazed by the amount of support received from those wanting to help victims of the Auckland Anniversary Floods and Cyclone Gabrielle.

The day after the flooding hit Auckland, KiwiHarvest rescued 8,000kgs of securely packaged food from Countdown Mairangi Bay, which could no longer be sold. This was heart-breaking for the staff as they had to close their doors for a number of weeks to repair the damage.

Following the event, our CEO, Angela Calver, worked with Haumarū Kai Aotearoa, New Zealand Food Safety (NZFS), to have a new protocol developed. This now officially allows Food Rescues to recover and redistribute food from food businesses affected by the flood waters.

Until then, there hadn't been a protocol in place, meaning flood-affected food had to be disposed of. After developing a thorough cleaning process and undergoing a series of testing to ensure the food was safe for human consumption, the new standard was set and a step taken towards a more sustainable future.

We saw an increase in volunteers at both Auckland branches, with many corporate groups wanting to jump onboard and lend a hand. This made a real impact on our outputs as we also had an increase in donations from businesses wanting to support with emergency relief. Our volunteers play a key role in the success of our mission and their continued support is greatly appreciated.

With the rise in living costs, the demand for food continues to climb. We are grateful to the 159 food donors who generously donated a combined total of 1,419,058 kilos of wholesome, nutritious food and non-food items, the equivalent of over 4 million meals redistributed into the community.

We look forward to bringing on more partners and are thankful of the remarkable efforts of our team throughout the year.





# DUNEDIN

## Integrity

**Dunedin is an integral part of the South Island community and as such KiwiHarvest continues to play an important role in rescuing food from the local bakeries, cafes and supermarkets and in turn, providing nourishment for vulnerable kiwis.**

By upholding our values of hard work and a collaborative mentality, the team continues to strive for an efficient service for food donors and recipients - always with integrity.

Over the course of the year, the inaugural KiwiHarvest branch rescued over 291,976 kilos of food from cafes, artisan bakeries and supermarkets during their daily runs. This equates to 834,217 meals in total put back into the Dunedin community.

KiwiHarvest Dunedin continues to build awareness regarding food waste in the local community. The proximity of our warehouse to the university enables us to build a good relationship with the university and a regular supply of student volunteers.

Similarly we work with the Otago Farmers Market to provide a service to the market stalls while growing awareness of food waste.

A heartfelt thanks goes out to all our food donors, recipient agencies, volunteers and funders. Your belief in our work and willingness to engage makes everyday a joy to be part of the positive difference we are collectively making.





# QUEENSTOWN

## Dedication

**The Queenstown team continue to show exemplary dedication to the KiwiHarvest mission. Their approach and execution of work reflects their commitment, regardless of the challenges they encounter. This dedication stemmed from a clear-eyed belief in the positive impact KiwiHarvest could achieve.**

**Kayleigh Simons-Smith, Queenstown Branch Manager, took maternity leave from October 2022 and Gary Hough, Queenstown Food Rescue Driver, stepped up to take the reigns in her absence. Gary has had a tremendous impact on the organisation and helped to bring in more food donors as well as awareness to the important work KiwiHarvest is doing in the Central Lakes area.**

The team managed to secure a 50% increase in rescued food compared to the previous financial year, bringing in a total of 133,734 kilos equating to over 382,097 meals worth of food for charities in the region.

The team took part in a number of events and opportunities over the year to shed a light on food waste and food insecurity in NZ, and highlight work being done within the food rescue space. This included the local A&P Show, the Wao Sustainability Business Tour, and the Trust the Chef style fundraising dinner. We were thrilled to also feature on an episode of Country Calendar.

Our 19 local volunteers served as an even clearer example of this unwavering commitment. They selflessly sacrificed their most precious resource - time - for the betterment of the wider community and a belief in the organisation's mission. Regardless of the challenges they faced, be it food shortages, financial constraints, or other obstacles, they made every effort to assist those in need during their most vulnerable times.

As business owners, the food donors faced different yet equally stressful challenges in a time of ongoing supply chain issues and business costs, as well as staff shortages. However, their belief and dedication in KiwiHarvest's purpose, motivated them to continue supporting the organisation. Despite other pressing factors, week after week, they ensured their systems remained operational and their excess food did not go to waste.





# INVERCARGILL

## Compassion

Looking back on the previous year it has really emphasised the difference KiwiHarvest Invercargill has made within our local community. The team have worked tirelessly and with compassion to get good food out to those who really need it.

KiwiHarvest Invercargill redistributed 246,068kgs of good, nutritious kai into Southland communities over the year, the equivalent of 703,051 meals.

In the short amount of time our branch has been operating we have provided over 1 MILLION MEALS, a huge milestone for our branch.

We are proud to have the support of all the local supermarkets in Invercargill and have expanded into the Hokonui and Southern regions, delivering much needed kai back into rural and isolated communities.

The team's hard mahi resulted in them being awarded as finalists in the 2022 Environmental Southland Community Awards.

We were grateful to be recognised alongside many other environmental champions.

With the support of Healthy Families Invercargill and Rotary Satellite Club of Southland, the branch was granted funding from Te Manawa Sporting. This funding was crucial in the lead up to Christmas, enabling us to purchase and distribute sporting equipment packs to 90 families throughout Southland. We plan to do much more, providing manakitanga to our whanau.

We have built a strong foundation here in Murihiku. With compassion we strive to better understand the needs in our region and provide that much needed kai support.

None of this would have been possible without our amazing food donors, funders, supporters, staff, recipients and most importantly our selfless volunteers who give up their time to help our Kaupapa, week in and week out.
